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An Eye in the Sky

The Service Authority recently implemented camera-equipped drone technology to inspect three of its elevated water storage tanks.

During the inspection of one of its tanks, the Service Authority discovered that an access hatch situated high up on the exterior of the tank was open. Instead of including the hatch closing as part of an all-day manual inspection, field staff quickly closed the hatch after viewing video footage provided by the drone's on-board camera.

According to Operations & Maintenance Contract Specialist Micah Archibald, drones are a huge time saver as well as a much safer method of inspecting water storage tanks, some of which reach up to 200 feet high.

"Manually inspecting just one tank can take an entire day," said Archibald. "A drone can do the same work in just a few hours in an equally, if not more effective, manner."

Connecting with Classrooms

The Service Authority just wrapped up another highly successful year of school outreach.

In 2018-19, the Community Outreach team engaged with nearly 10,000 students from Prince William County through classroom visits, tours of the H.L. Mooney Advanced Water Reclamation Facility and more than 20 special events. The classroom visits included more than 100 presentations at Title I

Schools, which have a high percentage of children from low-income families.

In addition, this spring's Water Art Invitational – an annual Service Authority art competition for Prince William County high school students – received a record number of entries.

"The Service Authority is always looking for new and creative ways to inform and educate young minds about the importance of clean water," said Education & Outreach Assistant Michelle Bouchard. "We had a tremendous year, and we're looking forward to an even better one in 2019-2020."
